MC Regatta Under Way

The first mid-winter sail-boat regatta for the 16-foot MC scow will get underway today at the Royal Palm Yacht Club. An expected 20 skippers, representing Wisconsin, Michigan, Louisiana, Georgia and Florida, will be attempting to outwit each other on the triangular course in the Caloosahatchee River.

The two day event will cast off today at 10 a.m. with one race. Two heats starting at 2 p.m. will follow. Two additional races on Sunday morning will conclude the five-race regatta.

The 16-foot MC scow is a one design class from the drawing board of Harry Melges Sr., a winter resident of Fort Myers. The boat carries a single 135 square feet sail and can be sailed either singled handed or with a two-man crew.

Local skippers who will command their ships in the event will be Dr. Robert Boudreau, Ray Fauquet and winter resident Buck Bassinger.

Jim Kinsey and Fauquet will be acting as race officials.

Twelve skippers participated in a "tune-up" race Friday with Harry Protzeller of Shreveport, La., crossing the finish line first. Bill Freytag of Lake Geneva, Wisconsin placed second, Frank Keeman of Fenton, Mich., third and Steve Page representing Winter Park, Fla., fourth.

The Race Committee may alter this schedule as it thinks desirable.

RULES:

All races will be sailed in accordance with these instructions, the current rules of the North American Yacht Racing Union, and the Rules of Racing of the IMCCSRA.

ELIGIBILITY AND ENTRY - MEASUREMENT AND WEIGHING:

Yachts of MC Racing Association members may be entered by completing entry formalities at the Regatta Registration table in the R.P.Y.C. clubhouse. Hulls and sails will not be measured; however, boats will be weighed. The Board of Governors of the IMCCSRA has authorized this regatta to be conducted using 420 pounds as the minimum weight to evaluate the merits of this weight, which most consider to be more suitable than the present 440-pound minimum.

COURSES AND COURSE SIGNALS - TIME LIMIT

The preferred course will be a triangle followed by windward, leeward, and windward legs, leaving all marks to port. The triangle will be either equilateral, or isosceles with 45, 90, 45 degree angles. When conditions make these courses impractical, an all-triangular or a windward-leeward course may be substituted—either course to finish with a windward leg. Either the preferred course or a triangular course may be modified by specifying that marks be left to starboard, in which case code flag "R" will be displayed in advance.

One of the following letters will be displayed before the Warning Gun (black letter on white board) to announce course shape:

"O" Either of the preferred courses

"T" Triangles plus windward leg

"W" Windward-leeward-windward

The course may not be shortened after the start. Time 1 t - $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

MARKS:

A sample mark and description will be at the skippers' meeting.

ONE-HALF-HOUR GUN:

One gun will be fired and the "RC" flag erected, near the club dock from the Race Committee flagship approximately 1/2 hour before each Warning Signal, except for those races sailed back to back.

STARTS; STARTING AND FINISH LINES:

The Warning, Preparatory, and Starting Signals will be made at five-minute intervals, and each lowered 30 seconds before the next. However, for any start following a general recall, the Warning Signal will be omitted. Starting and finish lines will be between the "RC" flag on the flagship and the nearby mark.

CHANGE OF MARK LOCATION:

If necessary after the start to provide a brue beat to windward or dead run to leeward, either the windward or the leeward mark will be repositioned. Before any yacht has rounded the preceding mark, a race committee boat located near that mark will hoist code flag "C" and fire 1 GUN. The committee boat will remain in position until most of the fleet has passed.

LIFE JACKETS:

When code flag "D" is hoisted and one gun fired all sailors shall don life jackets and continue to wear them so long as flag "D" remains hoisted. (Contestants are responsible for their personal safety whether or not code flag "D" has been hoisted.) The USCG requires all boats to carry at least one Coast Guard approved life saving device for each person aboard.

INDIVIDUAL RECALLS:

Individual premature starters will be notified by the flying of code flag "F" and one horn blast for each yacht. The Race Committee will attempt to hail each yacht, and also will attempt to inform her when she has returned for a proper start.

WITHDRAWALS:

Any boat withdrawing from a race must immediately inform the race committee.

SCORING:

- 1. Each yacht which finishes in a race shall score points as follows:
 - a. First place 3/4 point
 - b. Second place and after Place number

At least three races must be completed to complete the Regatta. There will be no throw out.

- 2. Each yacht which starts a race but does not finish, including yachts which infringe rules and retire from the race course within a reasonable time, shall score the points for a last place finish based upon the total number of yachts which started that race.
- 3. Each yacht which infringes rules but does not retire from the race course within a reasonable time, or which is disqualified with or without protest, shall score the points for a last place finish, based on the number of yachts which started that race, plus ten per cent of the number of yachts which started that race. If this formula shall result in a score containing a fractional point, it shall be raised to the next higher whole point.
- 4. A yacht which fails to start a race shall, for that race, receive the points for a last place finish, based upon the total number of yachts which registered to compate in the series less the number of yachts registered which fail to start at least one race in the series.
- 5. Should the Protest Committee determine that a yacht has been materially prejudiced by rules infringment by another yacht, the committee may score the prejudiced yacht by averaging its points in all other races of the series, to the nearest tenth of a point, and awarding the result as the prejudiced yacht's score for the race in which it was materially prejudiced.
- 6. The yacht (or skipper, where applicable) having the lowest total score after the last race of the series shall be deemed the victor.

7. In the event that there shall be two or more yachts having the same score, the tie shall be broken in favor of the yacht having the greater number of first place finishes. If a tie shall remain, the greater number of second place finishes shall control, and so on, until the tie shall be broken. If this method shall fail to resolve the tie, the tie shall stand as the final placings of the series.

PROTESTS:

A yacht intending to protest shall display a red flag, attempt to notify the Race Committee at the finish line of her intention, and meet all other requirements of NAYRU rule 68. The written protest must be filed in the clubhouse with the Race Chairman or his designee with one hour of the landing of the flagship. Normally protests will be heard after the day's racing is completed, in a designated area at the Yacht Club.

CHANGES IN SAILING INSTRUCTIONS:

Any such changes will be posted before the one-half-hour gun for the nest scheduled race.

TROPHIES:

Trophies for permanent possession will be awarded for places one through five.
